Name: **Underdressed**Medium: Block Print

It showcases the struggles of women in the 19th century and the toll it took for women to constantly succumb to societal pressures. The fairies represent an innocence usually lost through time and appreciation of raw humanness.

Name: **Budding Love** Medium: Dry Point Size: 20cmx25cm October 2019

Exhibition Text: Budding Love is a dry point print, inspired by Alphonse Mucha's Flower, and flower symbolism. The piece represents the feelings you experience when you realize you love someone, as well as the happiness your loved ones enable you to feel through genuine affection and care. Exhibition Text: Madame Veto Herself is a diptych illustration depicting the values of everything and nothing, and how you are most fulfilled when by yourself. My piece is inspired by the life of Marie Antoinette (nicknamed Madame Veto for her low public appeal)
